THE TRUE STORY OF THE WORLD'S FIRST BLACK FIGHTER PILOT.



SYNOPSIS

New York, December 1959. Host of "The Today Show" DAVID GARROWAY rushes into an elevator on his way to the live broadcast. The elevator jams. David demands the elevator operator get them moving again and the taciturn old African American tries but nothing works. The two men are stuck. Boredom sets in. David asks about the line of medals on the colored man's uniform. The man explains they are for fighting in both world wars. He introduces himself as EUGENE and claims to not only be France's most decorated war hero but also the world's first ever black fighter pilot. David laughs but Eugene is serious. He tells David his story:

Eugene's father was a Haitian immigrant who dreamed of escaping America's legalized racism for France, where all people were treated as equals. When ten year old Eugene saw the Klan lynch his father he escaped and reached a harbor where he stowed away on a ship to Europe. Months later Eugene arrived in London where he wandered the streets until, filthy and starving, he entered a boxing gym run by an ex-fighter. The gnarly old boxer took Eugene in and taught him to box. Eugene began fighting for money. As a teenager he was selected for a tournament in Paris and was amazed that everything his father had said was true. After the fight he decided to stay. Then war came.

Eugene joined the French Foreign Legion. He fought at Verdun and Champagne and was so fearless and skilled, he was selected for "THE SWALLOWS OF DEATH", France's elite fighting corp. Eugene narrowly escaped death so many times he was given the moniker "THE BLACK SWALLOW" and the myth around him slowly grew. He was badly wounded at Verdun but rather than sit out the rest of the war he became a pilot and racked up enough enemy kills to become an Ace. America entered the war and Eugene assumed his own country's air force would welcome him. He was told Blacks couldn't fly and was made to work the kitchens.

After the war Eugene married French aristocrat MARCELLE STRAUMANN and opened a cabaret club. He counted JOSEPHINE BAKER and EARNEST HEMINGWAY as his friends. When World War II broke out the French government asked Eugene, who spoke German, to spy on the Nazi top brass who drank in his club. At the same time he gave safe harbor to Jews in his basement. A German soldier discovered Eugene's operation and Eugene had to flee. With his two young daughters he navigated war torn Europe and made his way back to the U.S.

When Eugene finishes his tale, David is amazed. The men are freed from the elevator and David has his assistant check Eugene's story. It's true. David reproaches himself; for years he had brushed past a real life hero. He invites Eugene onto his show to tell the world his story.

For Eugene, fighting came easy. Being a hero however came at a price. By his own admission, Eugene wasn't an attentive husband to Marcelle.

When he became a nightclub owner between the wars, he enjoyed his celebrity status to the full, schmoozing with famous friends and leaving the parenting to his wife. Though Eugene loved Marcelle passionately, he loved the nightlife more. Eventually they separated.

After France fell to Germany in World War Two, Eugene saved his infant daughters from nazi death squads and took them back to America. Life in the country of his birth proved far more challenging for Eugene than the battlefield ever had. Suddenly he was just another African American on the breadline.

His relationship with his two daughters became fractious as they grew up. Our film will of course depict Eugene's historic achievements but also show his struggles as a husband and father.

At the end of his life, Eugene's journey came full circle when he finally renounced violence and joined his daughter Jackie in her support of Martin Luther King's non violent Civil Rights movement.




